

Dear Daggett County Residents,

Currently, individuals 70 years of age and older are eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine and there has been overwhelming interest and request for a vaccine from these members of our communities.

The COVID-19 vaccine is currently being distributed to individuals throughout the state and TriCounty Health Department receives shipments weekly, however, the amount of vaccine is determined by availability and state-wide distribution allocation.

COVID-19 vaccination appointments are available through the TriCounty Health Department. To set a vaccination appointment, individuals should visit the [TriCounty Health](https://tricountyhealth.com) website (<https://tricountyhealth.com>), click "Local COVID-19 Information" and scroll down to the box of instructions titled "COVID-19 Distribution to 70 years and Older." Buttons for which office location (Roosevelt or Vernal) is linked to a registration form for the specific office. Anyone who desires an appointment (70 years old or older) should complete the registration process, which allows to set up first and second appointments for the two dose series, four weeks apart. Confirmation gives date and time. Individuals are not considered vaccinated until the two doses have been administered.

TriCounty Health Department asks the public to assist us in reaching elderly persons that may need assistance with internet access or those that need help scheduling an appointment and navigating tricountyhealth.com. Furthermore, if elderly persons in your community need help getting to their appointment, we ask that our communities pull together to offer assistance. Your ability to assist those that need help in this area will help us in our efforts to protect this vulnerable population.

Happy St. Patrick's Day Lucky Facts

1.) We should really be wearing blue on St Patrick's Day.

Saint Patrick himself would have to deal with pinching on his feast day. Though we've come to associate kelly green with the Irish and the holiday, the 5th-century saint's official color was "Saint Patrick's blue," a light shade of sky blue. The color green only became associated with the big day after it was linked to the Irish independence movement in the late 18th century.

2.) St. Patrick wasn't Irish.

Although he made his mark by introducing Christianity to Ireland in the year 432, Patrick wasn't Irish himself. He was born to Roman parents in Scotland or Wales in the late 4th century.

3.) St. Patrick's Day used to be a dry holiday.

As you might expect, St. Patrick's Day is a huge deal in his old stomping grounds. It's a national holiday in both Ireland and Northern Ireland, but up until the 1970s, pubs were closed on that day. (The one exception went to beer vendors at the big national dog show, which was always held on St. Patrick's Day.) Before that time, the saint's feast day was considered a more solemn, strictly religious occasion. Now, the country welcomes hordes of green-clad tourists for parades, drinks, and perhaps the reciting of a few limericks.

4.) New York City's St. Patrick's Day Parade has been happening since 1762.

New York City's St. Patrick's Day Parade is one of the world's largest parades. Since 1762, roughly 250,000 marchers have traipsed up 5th Avenue on foot—the parade still doesn't allow floats, cars, or other modern trappings. Cardinal Timothy Dolan, the Archbishop of New York; and Miracle on 34th Street actress Maureen O'Hara have served as Grand Marshal.

5.) Chicago literally runs green for St. Patrick's Day.

New York may have more manpower, but Chicago has a spectacle all its own. The city has been celebrating St. Patrick by dumping green dye into the Chicago River since 1962. And though the organizers won't reveal their exact formula, we do know that the orange powder used is dispersed through flour sifters by the local Plumbers Union.

6.) For some St. Patrick's Day parades, it's the thought that counts.

Not every city goes all-out in its celebratory efforts. From 1999 to 2007, the Irish village of Dripsey proudly touted that it hosted the Shortest Saint Patrick's Day Parade in the World. The route ran for 26 yards between two pubs. Today, Hot Springs, Arkansas, claims the title for brevity—a mere 98 feet.

7.) There's a reason for the shamrocks.

How did the shamrock become associated with St. Patrick? According to Irish legend, the saint used the three-leafed plant (which is not to be confused with the four-leaf clover) as a metaphor for the Holy Trinity when he was first introducing Christianity to Ireland.

8.) Cold weather helped St. Patrick's claim to fame.

In Irish lore, St. Patrick gets credit for driving all the snakes out of Ireland. Modern scientists suggest that the job might not have been too hard—according to the fossil record, Ireland has never been home to any snakes. Through the Ice Age, Ireland was too cold to host any reptiles, and the surrounding seas have staved off serpentine invaders ever since. Modern scholars think the “snakes” St. Patrick drove away were likely metaphorical.

9.) There's no corn in that beef.

Corned beef and cabbage, which has become a St. Patrick's Day staple for Irish Americans, doesn't have anything to do with the grain corn. Instead, it's a nod to the large grains of salt that were historically used to cure meats, which were also known as “corns.”

10.) Americans run up quite a bar tab on St. Patrick's Day.

It's estimated that 13 million pints of Guinness will be consumed worldwide on St. Patrick's Day, and in America, overall beer sales will be up 174 percent. In fact, it's the biggest day for bars in the country. And in general, it's expected that Americans will spend over \$6 billion celebrating the holiday come March 17.

11.) It could have been Saint Maewyn's Day.

According to Irish legend, St. Patrick wasn't originally called Patrick. His birth name was Maewyn Succat, but he changed it to Patricius after becoming a priest.

12.) St. Patrick's lingo makes sense.

You can't attend a St. Patrick's Day event without hearing a cry of “Erin go Bragh.” What's the phrase mean? It's a corruption of the Irish Éirinn go Brách, which means roughly “Ireland Forever.”

Corned Beef and Cabbage I



What's more Irish than a traditional recipe for corned beef and cabbage? Serve with mustard or horseradish if desired.

Prep: 10 mins

Cook: 2 hrs 25 mins

Total: 2 hrs 35 mins

Servings: 5

Yield: 5 servings



Ingredients

3 pounds corned beef brisket with spice packet

10 small red potatoes

5 carrots, peeled and cut into 3-inch pieces

1 large head cabbage, cut into small wedges

Directions

Step 1

Place corned beef in large pot or Dutch oven and cover with water. Add the spice packet that came with the corned beef. Cover pot and bring to a boil, then reduce to a simmer. Simmer approximately 50 minutes per pound or until tender.

Step 2

Add whole potatoes and carrots, and cook until the vegetables are almost tender. Add cabbage and cook for 15 more minutes. Remove meat and let rest 15 minutes.

Step 3

Place vegetables in a bowl and cover. Add as much broth (cooking liquid reserved in the Dutch oven or large pot) as you want. Slice meat across the grain.

Know Before You Go Out in the Snow

17, February 2021 – In light of recent tragic events and the 21 fatalities during the 2020-2021 winter season, the USDA Forest Service wants to remind recreationists to think ahead, plan, and prepare for outings on National Forest System lands and recreate responsibly.

To #RecreateResponsibly means to keep yourself healthy, keep others safe, and preserve and protect public lands. With another 2-3 months of winter remaining, visitors should exercise increased caution when recreating in winter weather. Visitors can mitigate their risk by doing the following:

- *Know Before You Go* – Check the forecast in advance. Find out if a recreation fee or permit is required. Bring the proper clothing and gear, packing extra layers, waterproof clothing, and avalanche safety gear. In addition, some areas can become dangerous with winter conditions. Keep in mind that roads and facilities may be closed in winter. Visit www.fs.usda.gov/visit/know-before-you-go for more information.
- *Recreate with respect* – Be respectful of other visitors and the place you are visiting by keeping pets on leash, packing out all trash and waste, and leaving the area better than you found it. Practice physical distancing by covering your nose and mouth and eating and resting outside. If you feel sick, stay home.
- *Plan your route in advance* – Go early or during the week when visiting popular areas. If possible, visit other sites to beat crowds. Explore locally as driving and parking may be more challenging in winter. Know what kind of roads you will be driving on and ensure that you have the right vehicle to make it to your destination. Do not rely on cell coverage or GPS. Instead, carry a paper map and know how to read it.
- *Keep in touch* – Always let someone know the details of your trip, including where you're going and when you will be back. Be sure to stick to your plan.
- *Play it safe* – Know your limits and your gear. Slow down and choose lower-risk activities to reduce your risk of injury.

By preparing ahead of time and using the resources provided, recreationists become aware of the dangers associated with winter recreation. Recreating responsibly, especially during the winter months, helps save lives.
