
September 21, 2023, was a historic day for Daggett County and the State of Utah as the Browns Park Roadway in the eastern part of Utah was officially paved from the Wyoming State Line to the Colorado State Line. In the early 1980s the governors of the State of Wyoming, Utah and Colorado pledged that each state would pave their respective portion

of the Browns Park Roadway. Shortly after the agreement was made, Colorado paved their section of the road. Daggett County first started major improvements to the road with the grading of the road from the Wyoming State line in 1978. The bridge over Red Creek was constructed in 1984. In 1995, the roadway improvements were extended through Martin Draw and the roadway was paved from the Wyoming State line to Red Creek. The Jesse Ewing Canyon realignment and paving was completed in 2008. In 2012, there was a project to repair the slide that happened in Jesse Ewing Canyon and to extend the roadway improvements to the Colorado State line including paving. In 2015, the roadway from the turn off to Three Corners to Red Creek was paved. This year completed the paving from the turn off to Three Corners area to the paving in Jesse Ewing Canyon. The Flaming Gorge Road and Transportation District, the County Road Department, the Permanent Community Impact Board (CIB), Utah Joint Highways, and the Utah Department of Transportation were all instrumental in the funding and construction of the roadway. Having the roadway paved has already received a lot of praise from tourists, local guide services and the local resorts. It will be a great benefit to Daggett County.

As September comes to a close, we want to thank everyone involved in the Labor Day celebrations; volunteers, participants and spectators alike. From the parade, activities at the park, the museum bake sale, a very successful PRCA two night rodeo event, Parade of Lights and multiple other activities that brought a successful Labor Day weekend to the entire county. As the mountains give way to a rainbow of color (along with the Kokanee salmon) we hope to enjoy fall with the same success as the summer provided. We have hunting season upon us and remember fishing on the Green River is always spectacular this time of year! Next month we'll communicate updates on grants and projects throughout the county.



Recipe Of The Month

Chewy Pumpkin Cookies

INSTRUCTIONS: For the Spiced Sugar; In a small bowl mix the granulated sugar and pumpkin pie spice together. Set aside. 1/4 cup (50 g) granulated white sugar, 1/2 tsp pumpkin pie spice. For the Pumpkin Cookies; Preheat oven to 350 degrees and line two baking sheets with parchment paper. Start by drying your pumpkin. (This step is not optional. The cookies will not bake properly if you skip this step.) Spread the canned pumpkin on a plate and lightly press with a paper towel to absorb the excess liquid. Repeat the step at least four more times. The pumpkin should be dry enough that it goes from being 1/2 cup dried down to just about a 1/4 cup. Hardly any liquid should transfer onto a paper towel once it has been dried enough. (Like stated above, try to use Libby's canned pumpkin as almost all cans of it have the same consistency and are not too wet.) Then set aside. 1/2 cup (122 g) canned pumpkin puree. In a small bowl, whisk together the flour, pumpkin pie spice, baking soda, baking powder and salt. Set aside. 1 3/4 cups (219 g) all purpose flour, spooned and leveled, 1 tbsp pumpkin pie spice, 1/2 tsp baking soda, 1/2 tsp baking powder, 1/2 tsp salt. In a large bowl cream the softened butter and brown sugar together with an electric mixer on high speed for 1-2 minutes until light and fluffy. 3/4 cup (168 g) unsalted butter, softened, 1 cup (220 g) light brown sugar, packed. Add in the egg yolks and vanilla and mix on medium speed until pale and fluffy, about 1-2 minutes. 2 egg yolks, at room temperature, 2 tsp vanilla.

Add in the pumpkin and mix on medium-low speed to combine. Add in the dry ingredients and mix on low speed just until combined. Scoop the dough with a 2 tablespoon cookie scoop, and roll them into balls. Then roll the dough balls in the spiced sugar. (If the dough is too "sticky" chill it in the fridge for 10 minutes, then proceed.) Place the cookie dough balls at least 2 inches apart on the baking sheets. (I usually bake 6 at a time.) Bake the cookies for 12-14 minutes. (12 minutes for really chewy centers, 14 minutes for a slightly crispier cookie). When the cookies are done baking the centers will be puffy. As they cool the centers will fall and the cookie will get "wrinkly". Let the cookies cool on the baking sheet for 5 minutes, then transfer them to a cooling rack to finish cooling. They are best enjoyed when they have cooled for at least 15 minutes!



INGREDIENTS

For the Spiced Sugar

- 1/4 cup (50 g) granulated white sugar
- 1/2 tsp pumpkin pie spice

For the Pumpkin Cookies

- 3/4 cup (168 g) unsalted butter, softened
- 1 cup (220 g) light brown sugar, packed
- 2 egg yolks, at room temperature
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 cup (122 g) canned pumpkin puree Libby's works best
- 1 3/4 cups (219 g) all purpose flour, spooned and leveled
- 1 tbsp pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt

School District Updates

DAGGETT SCHOOL DISTRICT BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

The Daggett School District held a Truth and Taxation Hearing in Manila on August 8th at 6PM, followed by a regularly scheduled Board meeting. During the hearing Superintendent Northcott explained while a portion of the district's tax plan proposed an increase, another portion proposed an equal decrease, resulting in a net change of zero. What this means is that any changes in your tax bill would be the result of a change in property valuations and/or other tax rate changes implemented by other governmental entities. The specifics of the district's tax plan changes can be found on the district's website.

Our regularly scheduled Board meeting highlights of August 8th are noted below:

- The Board approved the district's 2023-2024 tax rates and final FY2024 budget.
- The District presented plans to implement a new website that is expected to be much more user friendly, improve communications and provide opportunities for back and forth dialog. This change is expected to be up and running by the beginning of school.
- The Board has approved full time kindergarten and an expanded morning pre-school/pre-kindergarten. This will be a change from last year's ½ morning extended day kindergarten and shorter afternoon pre-school/pre-kindergarten. These programs are set to begin this year.
- The District's Day Care Program is ready to go and will start at the beginning of the school year.
- The District presented some key organizational changes for this next school year which are displayed in the following chart:

- The Board approved an increase for school meals of 25 cents per meal. School breakfasts are now \$2.30 for elementary students and \$2.40 for high school students. Lunches are \$2.80 for elementary students and \$3.05 for high school students. There is no change for those students eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
- The District reported that they have purchased a new bus. This occurs about every four years. Delivery is set for January 2024.
- The Board also approved the district's most recent Surplus and Destroy lists. Items on these lists will be available for public sale or will be destroyed. Contact Lynette Asay at the District Office (435-784-3174 Ex 100) with any questions.

PETROGLYPHS

On Wednesday, August 30th, the Manila High School sophomore history class set out on a field trip to South Valley to explore our region's indigenous people. With the help of Bryan Smith, students were able to find and identify different petroglyphs from the Neolithic age and more recent Shoshone tribes. The area boasted an abundant collection of ancient history, some of which included a hunting scene, a bear, a herd of elk, a horned snake, and a shaman. The oldest petroglyph, dating back over 10,000 years, featured a woolly mammoth and multiple anthropomorphs. Even though the journey was a little hard, the petroglyphs were worth it, and the students enjoyed being outside in the sunshine.

Home Energy Assistance Target (HEAT) Program

Do you need help paying your home energy and water bills? The HEAT program provides energy assistance to low income households throughout the state of Utah. Assistance is on a one time basis and is subject to a qualifying process. You must reapply each program year (October 1st to September 30th). See details below for qualifying:

Eligibility Requirements for Energy Assistance/WATER Assistance:

- The total household income is at or below 150% of the Federal Poverty Level.
- The household is responsible for paying home energy costs.
- The household contains at least one US citizen or qualified non-citizen

Necessary Documentation

- A copy of your electrical/power, heat (Dominion, Propane, etc.) and water utility bills
- Proof of **ALL** income received by **all** household members in the month prior to the month of your application
- Proof of any eligible medical expenses, child support and alimony any member of the home paid in the month prior to the month of your application
- Proof of disability, if applicable
- Additional documentation, if required
- Fill out and complete an application

The Income levels are listed in the Federal Poverty Level chart below. We are required to use Gross amounts, but do allow for a 20% working wages income disregard. Any Medical paid out of pocket in the eligibility month can be used as a deduction. This includes but is not limited to: health insurance, copays, prescriptions, dental, eye care, etc. Child support or alimony paid out of pocket it also an allowable deduction. Receipts must be provided.

WHAT IS IT?

Annually, at the beginning of October, TriCounty Health Department holds a drive thru flu clinic. This drive thru clinic allows opportunity for TriCounty Health Department to exercise emergency plans, so the public and TriCounty Health Staff know what to do in the event the Department has to mass vaccinate (or medicate) the entire population of the tri-county area. In an event of real life mass vaccination (or medication) due to a pandemic or epidemic, TriCounty Health Department would set up Point of Dispensing locations. The Flu Shoot Out simulates this set up.

Getting your flu shot early in the season will help prevent influenza. TriCounty Health Department administers flu vaccine to children six months old to adults and senior citizens. Seasonal flu shots protect against three or four different strains of influenza viruses that research suggests may be the most common during the upcoming season.




